Greetings, Tansi, Bonjour,

This year we saw a regular return to school for all staff and students. Priority areas included a focus on attendance, mental health and wellbeing and learning. The return to school included new and former events and extra-curricular activities enjoyed by students and staff. It was a pleasure to see the return of the Knights of Columbus track meet, the Mile 20 camps, the grade 8 promotion dance and the grade 12 graduation ceremony, along with other activities throughout the district. The following is a snapshot of what happened in school for the 2022/2023 school year.

Attendance across the district was 83%. The provincial target rate is 90%. There are a number of legitimate factors that impact attendance but there is also a population of chronic nonattenders. It can't be stressed enough that attendance impacts learning. This year the transiency rate was higher than in the past. It is most likely attributed to the affects of COVID. We had 736 students transfer into the district and 509 students transfer out. Our student population on September 30, 2022 was 2963. There were 205 unclaimed pupil files.

The district was up for a review on the annual continuous improvement plan with Manitoba Education and Early Childhood Learning (MEECL). Recommendations from the review included the continuation of the commitment to cultural proficiency and building the capacity of staff to respond to Indigenous and non-Indigenous learners. They highlighted the creation of many classroom resources such as the land-based tubs to support teaching of Indigenous ways of knowing, being, and doing. They recommended the district continue with the ongoing gathering, analysis and reflection of data for learning. Lastly, it was suggested that the district celebrate the gains in English and Numeracy Skills.

The province provided dollars through a Strengthening Student Support and Learning fund that allowed schools and the district team to deliver programming based on curriculum and mental health and well-being opportunities. There were many projects. A few of the projects included home reading programs, wellness sessions, additional numeracy and literacy supports and land-based learning opportunities.

The district remained committed and thankful for the Mino Pimatisiwin program at two schools. The Kokums provided students a space to learn about traditional knowledge as well as a safe space within the school. Many of the schools provided programming through the Elders and Knowledge Keepers fund. Activities

included traditional events as well as an event for the visiting players and coaches during the AAA basketball provincials. The district will continue to receive the funding to grow the Elders and Knowledge Keepers programming.

The district committed to professional development though the Manitoba Rural Learning Consortium. Each session provided training over the course of the year. Some of these are a 2 year commitment and will continue this year. This was something new for the northern districts. We had 42 participants. The sessions attended were K-3 reading, numeracy achievement programs for grade 6 & 9, and instructional leadership in administration in which all of the school administration attended. The grade 8 / 9 transition team was very busy over the year. The team met 5 times throughout the year to work through academic and social transition plans. Core-competencies in English language arts and numeracy were created for grade 8/9 teachers as well as attention to credit acquisition in grade 9. As a result, summer school was provided for grade 9 / 10 students to obtain core courses credits. Social activities included the grade 9 luncheon, transition camps, book club, letters to grade 9 teachers and a district promotion dance.

All school district employees completed the Respect in Schools as mandated by the province. All coaches, staff and volunteers, were also required to complete the Respect in Sport. Moving forward this will be remain a requirement for all staff and coaches.

In the late spring, the district was informed that MEECL would provide funding for 2 new community schools. Juniper Elementary and Burntwood Elementary were the schools identified. With Wapanohk Community School, there are now three community schools providing programming for families and students. I'd like to thank the staff, students and caregivers for their perseverance and commitment. A huge thank you to our community partners who without them, some of our programs wouldn't be able to run and to Paul Anderson for always making time to ensure school events are available to the community and beyond.

Welcome back to another year!

I hope that this past summer was wonderfully relaxing for you and your family. I cannot express what a privilege it is to continue serving the School District of Mystery Lake as the Superintendent of Human Resources and Policy. The School District of Mystery Lake is committed to our motto, "Success for all", whether this is your child's first year in the District or their last. Our teachers, support staff and administrators all share a common mission, which is, "to develop socially responsible lifelong learners with a strong sense of self worth by providing a diversity of educational experience". We recognize that we cannot do this alone and we will continue to reach out to our partners in the community to assist us in this pursuit.

I would like to take this opportunity to celebrate some of the many successes of the 2022-2023 school year in the area of Human Resources and Policy Development.

The Board of Trustees Policy Committee has completed its review of all policies and procedural by-laws. The scheduled review of the Administrative Procedure Manual was completed. Some of the more recent procedures that were developed and/or significantly revised to ensure compliance with legislative requirements include; Seclusion (3.B140), Tobacco Use/Vaping (1.A170), Moving Allowance (2.A.040), Smudging in Schools (1.A.190), Emergency Closing of School (8.60) and Out of Country/Out of Province Travel (8.080).

The School District of Mystery Lake welcomed 20 teachers at the New Teacher Orientation. I am pleased to announce that six of our new teachers are graduates of the Kenanow Bachelor of Education Program offered on the

Thompson UCN campus. I cannot express how grateful I am to the Kenanow program. Offering an Education Program in the north has significantly helped with our recruitment and retention of teachers. There is a shortage of teachers across Canada, therefore we are particularly fortunate to hire teachers who trained with a northern/indigenous perspective and are committed to staying in the north. If it were not for this program, recruiting and retaining teachers would be significantly more challenging than it presently is.

In November of 2022 eight teachers were selected through an application process to participate in our fourth cohort of Leadership Intern Program.

The programs' mandate is to provide teachers who have an interest in pursuing a career in Educational Administration with professional development opportunities to enhance their leadership capabilities. As a result of the program's success we have not hired an external candidate to fill an administrative position for well over a decade.

On behalf of senior administration and the Board of Trustees I would like to acknowledge the following staff members for twenty years of dedicated service to the School District of Mystery Lake; Todd Harwood, Jonathan Wamboldt, Bonny Sousa and Vanessa Nerbas.

To all the staff that retired in the spring, the School District of Mystery Lake wants you all to look back with pride on all you have accomplished and look forward with excitement to all the wonderful things that this next chapter in your life has in store for you. Enjoy your retirement! You have earned it!

Lastly, to all staff, thanks for all you do and have a wonderful year!!

2022-2023 Priorities









<u>Focus Area:</u> Our French immersion focus has been to develop and increase student vocabulary, to implement a standardized phonetic program for early readers, and to increase French speaking throughout all school events.

- Vocabulary development continues with opportunity for students to participate in school activities in French (ex: science fair) and consistent exposure to new vocabulary in classrooms.
- Raconte moi les sons & Raconte moi l'alphabet have been the chosen phonetic programs for our k-2 students. Teachers report student enjoyment of the programming, results show earlier ability to recognize letter sounds necessary to decode words.
- The largest FI endeavor this past year was the re-introduction of a school-wide Concours D'art Oratoire, a French speaking contest supported by Canadian Parents for French. All grade three to eight FI students prepared a speech which they delivered in their classrooms, and top three went to the school finals held in our gym. School finalists competed for opportunity to go to Winnipeg to compete in provincial finals. We also supported students with our numeracy support worker, Mrs. Dale, who worked with our Grade K-3 students to build on their math skills.



MESSAGE FROM THE SCHOOL PRINCIPAL

Wapanohk Community School is a Cree bilingual school that teaches the Cree culture and many ceremonial practices. We continue to be the largest elementary school in Thompson. Our Community Connector worked continuously encouraging families to send their students to school, running the breakfast program with our counsellor, and re-starting our FAST program for families. It was a good year without COVID restrictions.

We delivered a number of programs for Truth and Reconciliation. Each grade level picked a northern reserve to connect with. The students talked about the reserve, researched information on the internet, and invited members to talk to the students. Lastly, classes put up a visual representation of the reserves so the whole school and neighbourhood could learn about them. One of the highlights was the visit of Northern Grand Chief Garrison Settee; he read a storybook, sang and drummed and joined in with a round dance. Another highlight was Fox Lake actor Michael Lawrenchuk (Indian Horse) visiting the grade 5's. The grade 5's then visited Fox Lake and camped overnight on their ceremonial grounds. Our grade 6's interviewed the famous writer David Robertson by video conferencing. The grade 7's and 8's made hand drums with NCN's knowledge keeper Terrance Thomas. The grades 8's made traditional skirts and shirts for their promotion night. It was







These IDs included: Social Insurance Number, Birth Certificate, Manitoba Health Card, Status Card, MPI Identification Card, and MMF Citizenship Card.

This year, our graduation ceremony had a familiar look as we set up at the Thompson Regional Community Centre. Family and friends were present in-person for the June 29th ceremony. On that day, 131 graduates received their diplomas and/or leaving certificates.

Indicators

Students will achieve a graduation diploma (Academic, Vocational, and French Immersion) in 4, 5, or 6 years after beginning grade 9 or a school leaving certificate (Pathways & IDEAL), up to the age of 21 years.

Strategies/Results

R.D. Parker uses Connect products, that allow students and parents to check attendance, see assignments that are due and overdue, check current marks, and print assignments. Teachers work diligently to keep the information in Student Connect current. Last year we had over 3319 unique logins to Parent Connect and almost 8985 views in total. Students accessed Student Connect almost 67 220 times last year.

Automated calls were generated daily when a student missed a class so parents and guardians were aware. Teachers made calls home after 5-8 absences and again after 9-11 absences. Teachers went above and beyond in continuing to use new technologies and methods of teaching in their classrooms.

We continued our credit recovery program this year. During the school year, students took the credit recovery modules home to complete. Credit recovery is an opportunity for students who receive a minimum of 35% as a final grade, to complete work and receive the credit without repeating the entire course. Credit recovery is offered for the core subjects in grade 9 and 10 (English, Mathematics, Science, Social Studies & Geography) and all grade levels of physical education. 271 students were enrolled in credit recovery for the 2022-2023 school year and 101 credits were issued.

R.D. Parker offers a mature student program for students who have had difficulty achieving the 30 credits required to graduate. The program is held offsite from the main campus of R.D. Parker and has been very successful since its inception. This school year, thirty-nine students entered in the mature student program and twenty-three graduated on June 29, 2023. Additionally, five Pathways students received their diplomas and one IDEAL student received their school leaving certificates on June 29, 2023.

Strategies / Results

On Friday, March 24 we offered students and staff a pancake breakfast as a kick-off to spring and March break. With the students from Mme. Aube's Culinary Arts classes and students from Ms. Thorne's Foods & Nutrition class leading the charge in kitchens throughout the school, and assistance from administration and some support staff, pancakes were prepared for the entire R.D. Parker student body and staff. Ms. Roeckenwagner and her Pathways students served up our tasty pancake fare. This was the first time we tackled this endeavour with rave reviews!



This year, R.D. Parker's Indigenous Committee, comprised of seven teachers, continued the work that was started last year. This included planning activities for the week of Truth and Reconciliation at the end of September culminating with Orange Shirt Day that we observed on September 29, 2022. A new activity to get our students and staff thinking about T&R week was rock painting, as rocks are honoured as grandfathers in Indigenous culture. On



September 29, students and staff then placed their rocks along their walk to the Lions Park to acknowledge the harms and injustices of residential schools.

On March 16-17, 2023, the R.D. Parker Athletic Department hosted the AAA Provincial Basketball Tournament with 14 visiting teams from across the province coming to Thompson for this big event. To make their stay more

memorable, we wanted all players and coaches to get to know what northern life is like by participating in R. D. Parker's Mini Winter Festival events. Learning workshops included: Wild Meat Processing, Meet a Trapper, Traditional Medicines, Bannock Lessons, Jigging, Cree Lessons, Traditional Games, Soap Making, Dot Art, and Rock Painting. There were also many games and contests that took place both indoors and outdoors, such as: moose calling, jigging, bubble gum blowing, cracker eating, beading race, Inuit arm pull, leg wrestling, knock off the trapper, slooshing, \$\frac{1}{2}\text{ig} feet race, sled race, tug of war, and snow snakes. It all culminated with an outdoor wiener roast.

R.D. Parker continued our accreditation from Apprenticeship Manitoba for the Automotive Service Technician Program, Heavy Duty Equipment Technician Program, and Hairstylist Program. Our vocational programming included Automotive Service Technician, Heavy Duty Equipment Technician Program, Cosmetology, Carpentry, Culinary Arts and Design Drafting. A 0.25 high school apprenticeship program/career coordinator position continued this year.

All Grade 7 and 8 students in the district took Practical Arts classes at R.D. Parker. These classes include Food and Nutrition, Textile and Design, Woodworking, Metalworking, Indigenous Art, and Drafting. Indigenous Art classes showed off their painting skills by creating two scorekeeper benches when we hosted the AAA Provincial Basketball Tournament on March 16-17, 2023.

Community businesses were invited to participate in two job fairs held in the fall and spring this year at R.D. Parker. Businesses were invited to display relevant information

and meet with potential candidates for job openings within their companies. Clinical Services Shortage and Student Specific Plans



The School District of Mystery Lake uses a referral system for clinical services. The district utilizes professional services of psychologists, speech and language pathologists, occupational therapists and physiotherapists to help support appropriate programming for students. All of these professionals are accessed by the school team making a referral for services. The school district has been using a blended model of both in person and virtual services when referring students to the various different areas for assessments and recommendations. School teams can also access consultation with these professionals in order to determine if formal referrals are needed or what strategies could be attempted prior to a formal referral going in or while the student is on a wait list. School teams will incorporate the recommendations from clinicians to support a comprehensive approach to a student's goals and plan.

School psychologists have the skills and knowledge to help students succeed. They provide valuable input regarding the academic, behavioural, social and emotional development, and programming for children. Psychologists work with school teams to provide a range of services, such as: consultation, collaboration, assessment, diagnosis, treatment and therapy, prevention, interventions (direct and indirect, classroom, school, divisional and/or system focused).

School Speech-Language Pathologists are professionals in the area of human communication, its development and its disorders. Through the evaluation and assessment of speech, language, communication and swallowing skills, speech-language pathologists determine areas of concerns and approaches to address them. Speech-language services include: student-specific assessment, diagnosis and recommendations for programming, individual therapeutic intervention, individual or small group intervention programming and practice, parent and school staff education, classroom-based programming and support recommendations, assistive technology and/or communication devices, referral to outside agencies and collaboration with community programs.

As far as physiotherapy and occupational therapy, the school district contracts services through School Therapy Services in Winnipeg. Therapists visit Thompson roughly six times in a school year to support programming in the areas listed in the graphic to the right.

While the School District of Mystery Lake has been actively recruiting to fill clinician vacancies, there continues to be shortages across the province. As such, wait lists continue to grow and school teams, in consultation with other professionals, have to prioritize the needs of all children to

Cultural Proficiency Indigenous Perspective

Once again, this past school year has flown by as our Curriculum team worked hard to provide a variety of classroom initiatives, activities, events, and camps for students and schools. Central to our planning is the inclusion of Indigenous and Northern perspectives as well as promoting culturally proficient practices which supported curriculum learning outcomes in inclusive learning environments. As a result of working collaboratively, we were able to support and deliver meaningful programming that engaged students, staff, and community in creating healthy and respectful relationships.

We would like to thank the numerous community partnerships that helped make these district initiatives a success. Some of these partnerships included Jordan's Principle Staff, M.K.O., Ma-Mo-We-Tak Friendship Center, U.C.N Kenanaw and Early Childhood Programs, K.T.C, and N.R.H.A. This year we received funding from the Thompson Community Foundation as well as Knowledge Keepers and Strengthening Student Success Provincial Grants that significantly enhanced the delivery of the many land based initiatives we delivered to students, families, schools and the community at large.



Some of the initiatives and activities for the 2022-23 school year include:

- Co-hosted Fall Camp Partnership Week of Land Based Learning activities at Mile 20 Traditional Site (Grade 5 classes, Family Camps, Adult PD Day on the Land, UCN Pre-service Teachers)
- Hosted a variety of akihtaso Math Camps for all Grade 1 classes throughout the District
- Co-delivered 7 days of Cultural Proficiency/Blanket Exercise Training and 4 days of Land Based Day of Learning at Mile 20 Site for SDML Staff and Partnerships
- Continued to build the Indigenous Resource Library to promote our collective journey to truth and reconciliation focused on Indigenous and Northern perspectives, social justice, corrective history and culturally proficient practices
- Hosted SDML Mini Winter Festivals at all elementary schools from Feb. 28 March 24
- Hosted a Land Based Day with Winter Festival Competitions for athletes during Senior Basketball Provincials (hosted by RDPC)
- Hosted full day Blanket Exercise Sessions and Mental Health Workshops for Grade 7/8 classes at Deerwood, Burntwood, and Juniper schools
- Presented Seven Teachings mini workshop sessions for K-Grade 8 youth during National Indigenous Peoples Day (including Student Soaring Eagle Awards)
- Remained committed to Thompson Urban Indigenous Strategy Partnerships
- Continued to provide teachers with resources and other supports as requested
- Supported the Juniper School K-1/2 teachers to celebrate Bear Witness Day at Camp
- Supported the Annual Sihkwan Mamowewin Gathering at Mile 20 Site
- Hosted Grades 4, 5, and High School day camps focused on Mental Health & Land Based Learning



 Co-delivered 5 Transition Camps at Mile 20 and Scouts Camps for Grade 8s and High School mentors

Although our Curriculum Services Team will look different, we are excited for the upcoming school year and look forward to working in collaboration to deliver ongoing initiatives that promote student success and positive self identity to find Mino-Pimatisiwin.

Cree Language & Indigenous Perspective

Tansi,?edlanet'e, bonjour, hello everyone!

This past year, it seems as though we hit the ground running. I say "we" because I cannot say that I have accomplished many of the wonderful lessons, teachings and learning opportunities without first acknowledging that I am a part of something even bigger, a wonderful Curriculum Services Team. However, I will shed light on how some of the language and cultural work continues to create meaningful and lifelong learning for students.

Once again, along with the Family Outreach Coordinator, we supported two " $k\bar{o}kom$ in the school" $minopim\bar{a}tisiwin$ programs. $minopim\bar{a}tisiwin$ means "living the good life." Children had the opportunity to work with a grandmother in their respective schools. I have had the honour and privilege of seeing what this looks like in action. Children learned, at their own pace, life-skills such as using their best manners, thoughtfulness (baking a birthday cake for their classmate), being helpful (there was always someone willing to help $k\bar{o}kom$ with her



classroom), making traditional regalia, celebrating and honouring their hard work (beadwork), and many feasts to be shared with $k\bar{o}kom$. Once again, it has been a successful year with the $k\bar{o}kom$ in the school programs and it is exciting to know that the program will continue.

Inclusive Full Moon Ceremonies that honour all students have been well received this year and have continued at Burntwood School with the initial ceremony starting at Wapanohk Community School. Each ceremony would not have been possible without knowledge keepers, $n\bar{o}kom$ Shelley and Constable Turnbull. I would like to give them the acknowledgement they deserve. At each ceremony participants are given teachings, invited to sing songs of power, and are taught about gratitude. To be grateful for life. Every ceremony was unique, and nurtured a safe place to be oneself at all times. It was initiated to have schools encourage, empower and nurture positive youth identity because when students feel important, they begin to believe it themselves.

This year, I also had the opportunity to work with Chrissy Roeckenwagner, a pathways teacher at RDPC. I've visited her classroom as a guest speaker and knowledge keeper. Students learned about the 7 teachings and what this may look in their own life. They learned about the history of residential schools, colonial policies that affect Indigenous peoples, the true meaning of place names, and how we connect all across the western continent. To celebrate our learning journey together, we ended our time together with a feast. We had moose meat, beaver, berries and bannock. We invited elders, principals, curriculum services team and of course, the teachers and students. It brought everyone together and showed students that they do matter.

Finally, Wapanohk Community School held two Cree Spelling Bee's this year, one in January and another that coincided with the Cree Language Festival. The Cree Language Festival has been happening annually at Wapanohk School since 2008. *kinanāskomitinān* (we thank you) Jordan's Principle for donating the prizes for each grade category... fun prizes are always motivating for students! The Cree Bee is an initiative that began last year at Wapanohk School to encourage the *ininīmōwin* language throughout the school year.

It was an exciting year for all of this beautiful work that is being done by many members throughout School District of Mystery Lake. Once again, it would not be possible without the passionate educators, teachers, staff, knowledge keepers, and elders and of course...our students. All of this work is the foundation for moving together in reconciliaction!


Literacy Support—Early Years


The 2022-2023 school year saw all of the elementary schools continue to use the Early Literacy Intervention (ELI) Program for Grades 1-3 students. Early Literacy Intervention is a short term intervention that provides intensive, daily small group instruction in the areas of guided reading, guided writing and word work. One school received full day ELI services while the other 5 had half day support The ELI teacher provides an intensive program that supplements classroom literacy instruction. The ELI teachers were able to provide intervention services to 187 students over the course of the year with varying ranges of growth in literacy skills showing increases in benchmarks from 3 levels up to 7 or more levels.





This year 9 teachers were offered professional development alongside the literacy support teachers in reading instruction for Kindergarten to Grade 3. The Manitoba Rural Learning Consortium provided us with 4 full day presentations from Faylee Brownlee.







Literacy Support-Later Years

"Today a reader, tomorrow a leader." – Margaret Fuller

This quote captures the relationship between being literate and a good citizen, traits we all wish for our children. This year, Literacy Support continued to work closely with other members of the Curriculum Services team to incorporate literacy in the areas of numeracy, cultural proficiency, language and mental wellness.

Indigenous Peoples of Canada Giant Floor Map

This year, we were able to spend 12 days in schools presenting and exploring the Indigenous Peoples of Canada Giant Floor Map, reaching well over 300 students at all seven SDML schools. This 11m x 8m map shows the locations of Indigenous communities, residential schools, reserves and more. Instead of typical provincial or political borders, Canada is broken up into Indigenous language groups and treaties. Classes engaged in activities around scavenger hunts, measurement, timelines and so much more.



#IndigenousReads Book Club

Now in its second year, the #IndigenousReads Book Club met to discuss three selections throughout the year: Sugar Falls by David A. Robertson, Moon of the Crusted Snow by Waubgeshig Rice, and Braiding Sweetgrass for Young Adults by Robin Wall Kimmerer and Monique Gray Smith. This book club is meant to showcase Indigenous authors and stories, and encourage participants to bring what they discussed into their classroom practice.

Sharing Our Ideas



As part of Curriculum Services, Literacy Support was proud to be able to present the exciting work being done with SDML students at three educational conferences this year. Presentations on the ongoing akihtaso (Counting) Camps were delivered at the Elders and Knowledge Keepers Symposium, as well as the MTS Indigenous Chairs on Land Based Education gathering. We were also able to speak at the Indspire National Gathering for Indigenous Education, where we shared how puppets like kokum help develop language use and identity. While there, we learned what other school districts around the country have been using to meet the diverse needs of all students.

ELA Core Competencies

As a result of meeting with the Grade 8/High School Transition team, a working group of English Language Arts and Resource teachers from across the school district was formed in the Spring. Tasked with creating an easy-to-use tool to communicate expectations and highlight essential skills for Literacy success at RDPC, the working group developed two documents outlining ELA Core Competencies in both Reading and Writing. These documents will support teachers and staff as they continue to better prepare students to make the leap from elementary to high school.



Numeracy Support



It is hard to believe that another school year has come and gone. I guess that's what happens when we're having fun while naturally experiencing and making sense of Math in our world.

This year, one focus was on the K-4 foundational knowledge of Number. Through district testing, we were able to identify gaps in learning then provide school based Numeracy Support Workers to help our students grow. Some amazing games were added to game carts to ensure that math remained competitive, challenging and just a lot of good fun.

Opportunities to join a two year learning platform called the mRLC (Manitoba Rural Learning Consortium) took place this year. Twelve classroom teachers from grade 5 and 6 attended professional development sessions which helped us all learn about best teaching practices and use of assessment to guide instruction and reduce misconceptions. I am very excited that a second group will be joining us in the 2023-2024 school year.

Nothing says Mathematical Reasoning like a good book and a pile of scat. Or at least that was one memory brought back from akihtaso camp. ("counting" in ininew/cree). Our Curriculum Services team was able to offer half day camps to all Grade One classes throughout the district. While "reaching back" and filling voids in the foundations of Mathematics, opportunities to integrate literacy, cultural proficiency, language, and traditional teachings were attained. New Math on the Land Kits continue to be created and are being loaned to classroom teachers.

It has been an honor to be part of such an amazing curriculum services team. This year, our journey led us to southern Manitoba



where we were able to share ideas about the benefits of Land-Based Education and its natural ability to strengthen both literacy, numeracy and cultural proficiency in our children.

French Coordinator / coordinatrice de français

École Riverside School is the only elementary French Immersion school in SDML. Students have opportunity to continue their immersion endeavors through to grade twelve in RDPC to graduate with either a French certificate (seven credit hours), or French diploma (14 credit hours). French classes are available in English schools from grade 4-8, also with the option to continue French Communication & Culture classes in the high school.

A renewed Manitoban French Immersion policy states the following as the vision of the program:

The goal of the French Immersion Program is to develop proud, confident, engaged, plurilingual global citizens.

The French Immersion Program enables students to interact spontaneously, autonomously, and confidently in French with pride and ease. They seek opportunities to engage in the Francophone community. Their identity as Canadian citizens, competent in both French and English, creates lifelong opportunities and fosters openness to other languages and cultures.

This past year, the French Immersion teachers at École Riverside made a concerted effort to help students gain confidence in their French oral abilities by re-establishing the Concours d'Art Oratoire. Students researched, wrote, and then orally present 2-5 minute speeches in front of their classmates. Classroom finalists presented before a gymnasium full of peers, teachers, parents, and a panel of judges, vying for opportunity to travel to Winnipeg to compete in the provincial finals. It was occasion to celebrate student and teacher commitment to French language development and a positive step towards building student identity as capable French speakers. The event was a cumulation of facilitated

reflection upon student programming!


